Abstract:

A summary of the entire paper. Think of it as a snapshot that helps readers decide whether to read the full paper. This should be written in layman’s terms for readers of diverse background to be able to comprehend the information.

Keywords:

List 5–7 key terms relevant to your study. These help with indexing and quick identification of the study’s focus.

Introduction:

Introduces the research topic, background and why the study matters. It sets up the problem being addressed and states the research question or hypothesis.

(optional) Literature review:

Summarizes existing academic work related to your topic, identifying gaps your research addresses. It shows you’ve understood the field and are building on prior knowledge.

Methodology

Explains how the research was conducted through tools, experiments, data collection techniques or/and procedures used. This section allows others to replicate the study.

Results and Discussion:

Presents the data collected (results) and interprets what it means (discussion). It connects findings to the hypothesis and compares them with existing research.

Conclusion:

Summarizes the main insights from the study and their significance. It may also suggest future research directions or applications.

Acknowledgements:

Gives credit to individuals, institutions or funding bodies that helped in the research process but are not listed as authors.

References:

Lists all the academic sources, papers or materials cited in the research in APA/MLA format. Note: Stick to one format throughout the section.
